

#SummerLearningWeek July 15-19, 2024



For the past several years, our colleagues at the National Summer Learning Association held a national day of celebration dedicated to elevating the importance of summer learning. This year, their annual national awareness day has been transformed into a week-long celebration of the power of summer learning.

From east to west, north to south, summer learning and enrichment programs are soaring to new heights across Nebraska. Whether it be participating in sports, STEM camps, art clubs,

outdoor education, gardening or a host of other activities, thousands of Nebraska youth are getting hands on experiences learning and growing alongside their friends – and making new friends as they have new experiences.

We hope that you are able celebrate with the out of school time staff and community members leading these important activities in communities across Nebraska.





What a summer for conservation in Nebraska!

It was another incredible summer our Conservation Management Internship, introducing youth to conservation careers in Nebraska.

For the first two weeks of June, a group of six high school students and two mentors traveled across the state, learning about conservation efforts in Nebraska. They explored habitat and wildlife management, prairie ecology, and restoration, discovering how conservation varies yet remains interconnected across the Great Plains. The students contributed to habitat restoration and management in each of Nebraska's four ecoregions, explored six of Nebraska's Biologically Unique Landscapes, and were introduced to over 20 conservation careers! While every student know their exact career aspirations, they each saw how they might fit into a future conservation career—whether in scientific research, field biology, recreation, or even marketing and graphic design.



Students took away valuable insights for their future career paths and conservation efforts. One student reflected: "The big thing that I took away from it was just how much work goes into each person's job. I got to hear incredible stories of where people started and how they ended up at the place they are now".

Students all came away with a new perspective on conservation and appreciation for the work that goes into it. When asked about what they wish their peers knew about conservation in Nebraska, students reflected on the biological diversity and importance of maintaining it, the hard work that goes into conservation efforts across Nebraska, and the value those efforts provide to us all.

This achievement wouldn't have been possible without the support of Nebraska Wildlife Rehab, Fontenelle Forest, Ponca State Park, Prairie Plains Resource Institute, UNL's Cedar Point Biological Station, North Platte Natural Resource District, Meadowlark Hearth, Agate National Fossil Beds, Ian Nicolson Audubon Center at Rowe Sanctuary, and Crane Trust, Inc. A heartfelt thank you to these organizations and their teams of conservation leaders!

We wish to honor their connections to the land and their leadership in conservation of the Great Plains and, through this program, hope to foster future stewardship of this precious resource.
