Programs in Demand, But Out of Reach for Many

Demand for programs is enormous.

In Nebraska, the demand for afterschool programs is incredibly high. But just a fraction of Nebraska families who want afterschool programs have them.

Parents value the benefits afterschool programs provide for young people—keeping them safe, helping them build life skills, and getting them excited about learning—and say afterschool programs help parents keep their jobs and provide peace of mind.

Behind the demand: Parents see afterschool programs addressing their top-of-mind concerns.

An overwhelming majority of parents agree that afterschool programs benefit kids and parents.

78% Keeps them safe 83% Builds social skills and responsible decision making 79% Boosts teamwork, critical thinking, and leadership skills 73% Supports well-being 68% Excites them about learning and improves school attendance 83% Encourages fun and learning, decreasing screen time

With many Nebraska families facing barriers to afterschool participation, there is strong support for public funding.

NEBRASKA PARENTS SUPPORT ACCESS AND FUNDING.

More than 4 in 5 Nebraska parents (82%) agree that all young people deserve access to quality afterschool and summer programs and more than 5 in 6 (86%) are in favor of public funding for afterschool opportunities. Across political affiliations, support for public funding is high.

About the Survey

America After 3PM is a national online survey of parents or guardians of school-aged children, with supplemental interviews conducted by telephone. Data were collected by Edge Research on behalf of the Afterschool Alliance. In Nebraska, 350 households and 580 children were screened for this study. Child-level statewide projections are based on total school enrollment numbers for the 2021-2022 school year from the U.S. Department of Education, National Center for Education Statistics.
